

Telling Time

You may want to start with time to the half hour and fifteen minute intervals first.

It helps to warm up by counting by fives.

One thing many students have trouble with is figuring out the hour when the minutes are past 30 because the hour hand moves closer to the next hour. It may help to point out that the hour hand is not up to the new hour yet.

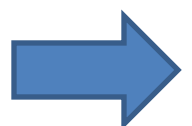
Skill 1: Telling Time

Set the clock to a time and ask your child to tell you the time.

Skill 2: Showing the Time

Give your child a time to show on the clock.

Using a real clock makes this activity easier because the hour hand will move with the minute hand. You can make a model clock from paper plates or use one of the paper clocks included here.

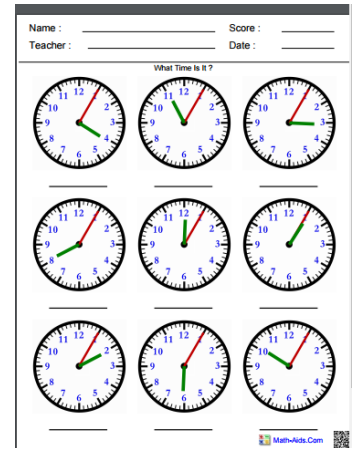
